NEW ENGLAND REVOLUTION



ROBERT KRAFT

INVESTOR/OPERATOR

Robert Kraft, founder, chairman and CEO of the Kraft Group, is an American entrepreneur, investor, and philanthropist whose portfolio of businesses and brands range across many verticals, including paper and packaging, sports and entertainment, real estate, and venture investing. His holdings include the New England Revolution, New England Patriots, Gillette Stadium, International Forest Products, Rand-Whitney Group, Rand-Whitney Containerboard and a portfolio of more than 100 venture and private-equity investments.

As Investor/Operator of the New England Revolution (Major League Soccer) and chairman and CEO of the New England Patriots (National Football League), Kraft has cultivated a championship culture in New England by delivering a combined 16 conference titles, six Super Bowl championships, and one MLS Supporters' Shield between the two teams. In addition to building a pair of championship-driven franchises, Kraft has committed the resources necessary to transform an undeveloped parcel of land that he purchased in 1985 into Gillette Stadium – a premier concert, entertainment, and event venue that both franchises call home.

Kraft's long-standing support of soccer in the United States dates back to the early 1990s, when he secured Foxboro Stadium's status as one of the nine host venues for the 1994 FIFA Men's World Cup. The success of the 1994 World Cup paved the way for a new era of New England sports. On June 6, 1995, the Kraft family became the founding Investor/Operator of the Revolution, joining Major League Soccer (MLS) as one of its 10 charter clubs for its inaugural season in 1996.

Under Kraft's leadership, the Revolution have made five MLS Cup appearances and celebrated U.S. Open Cup, North American SuperLiga, and Supporters' Shield titles. Foxborough has also played host to MLS Cup three times, including the 2002 Final between the Revolution and LA Galaxy, which was played at Gillette Stadium in front of what was then the largest crowd in MLS postseason history (61,316). In 2021, Kraft saw the Revolution set an MLS record with 73 regular season points and 22 wins en route to the club's first Supporters' Shield title.

The United States Men's and Women's National Teams have also enjoyed tremendous support from the Kraft family and soccer fans throughout New England. Since 1990, Foxborough has hosted 33 international matches involving U.S. national teams at Foxboro Stadium (1990-2001) and Gillette Stadium (2002-present). In addition to hosting matches during the 1994 FIFA Men's World Cup, Foxborough was a host city for both the 1999 Women's World Cup and the 2003 Women's World Cup. In 1999, more than 50,000 fans watched the U.S. Women's National Team defeat North Korea, 3-0, in the Women's World Cup. In 2011, the Men's National Team played before a New England-record crowd for a soccer match of 64,121 fans at Gillette Stadium against the then-defending FIFA World Cup champion Spain.

Most recently, Kraft helped secure the 2026 FIFA Men's World Cup for North America, the first tournament to be held on U.S. soil in more than 30 years, when he was named Honorary Chairman of the Board of the United Bid Committee of Canada, Mexico, and the United States in 2017. Boston will serve as one of 16 host cities for the tournament, which will see FIFA World Cup matches contested in Foxborough for the fourth time.

A native of Brookline, Mass., Kraft attended public schools before matriculating to Columbia College on an academic scholarship. Upon graduation, he received a fellowship to Harvard Business School, where he earned a master's degree in business administration.

Kraft also served on the board of directors and as a trustee for various organizations. A trustee emeritus at Columbia and Boston College, Kraft has also received honorary degrees from several colleges and universities.

Over the past five decades, Robert Kraft and his family have consistently donated time, resources, relationships, and expertise to a wide range of charities, nonprofits, and causes, resulting in lifetime giving in excess of \$800 million. While his philanthropic efforts have been a pillar of his life for more than 50 years, his contributions across a range of causes, particularly focused on social justice, healthcare and economic mobility have received well-deserved recognition in recent years.





JONATHAN KRAFT

INVESTOR/OPERATOR

Jonathan Kraft is the President of the Kraft Group which is comprised of companies in sports and entertainment, the paper and packaging industry, real estate, and private equity investing. He oversees the day-to-day operations of each company including Gillette Stadium, the New England Patriots, and the New England Revolution.

Kraft was integral in the founding of Major League Soccer (MLS), including contributing to the drafting of the original operating agreement, and helped grow the league with the Revolution as one of the league's inaugural clubs. He remains the only member of the MLS Board of Governors to serve since the league's launch in 1995. With Kraft's leadership and influence, the MLS selected Foxboro Stadium in New England to host the inaugural MLS Cup in 1996. Since then, the Kraft family has hosted multiple championship games in Foxborough including the 2002 MLS Cup which featured the Revolution and drew a record crowd of 66,000 people.

The Revolution have made appearances in five MLS Cup finals. The club won the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Championship in 2007 and the international North American SuperLiga Championship in 2008. In 2021, the Revolution won the Supporters' Shield title with an MLS-record 73 regular season points.

Kraft serves on multiple MLS executive committees, including the Business Ventures Committee of which he is Chair, the Advisory Finance Committee, the Media Committee, the Labor Committee, and the Expansion Committee.

A graduate of Williams College, Kraft is a Trustee Emeritus. He received his MBA from Harvard Business School, where he currently serves on the Dean's Board of Advisors. Kraft has served on the Board of Trustees of Massachusetts General Hospital since 2010 and was named chair in 2019. He is Chairman of the Board of Directors for the Paper + Packaging Board. He is also on the board of trustees for Belmont Hill School and Dexter Southfield. Additionally, Kraft is a member of the M.I.T. School of Engineering Dean's Advisory Council, board member for Mass General Brigham and sits on the advisory board for the Billie Jean King Leadership Initiative.

18TH MLS SEASON WITH REVOLUTION 12TH SEASON AS PRESIDENT

As President of the New England Revolution, Brian Bilello reports directly to the Kraft family and oversees all aspects of the club's business and soccer operations. He is responsible for establishing the club's strategic vision and fostering its implementation. Working closely with the Kraft family to represent the Revolution in league matters, Bilello has and continues to serve on several Major League Soccer and Soccer United Marketing committees.

Additionally, Bilello also played a leading role in the campaign to bring FIFA World Cup 2026™ to Boston as the President of Boston Soccer 2026, which resulted in Boston and Gillette Stadium being selected as official hosts for the 2026 tournament.

During his 20-year tenure with the Kraft organization, the Revolution have been to MLS Cup four times (2005, 2006, 2007, and 2014) and have won the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup (2007), the North American SuperLiga (2008), and the Supporters' Shield (2021) with an MLS record 73-point season.

Following the 2021 season, the club underwent its first major rebrand, introducing new logos and brand marks for the first time in New England's history. The reception was overwhelmingly positive across the region and the world as the club enhanced its image in a region with several proud and iconic sports franchises.

Ahead of the 2020 season, Bilello oversaw the development and construction of the Revolution's new Socios.com Training Center in Foxborough, the home of the Revolution first team, Revolution II, and Revolution Academy. The \$35-million facility is among the league's best and provides the original MLS club with a state-of-the-art headquarters complete with three professional-grade fields, multiple locker rooms, sports performance and athletic training facilities, and more.

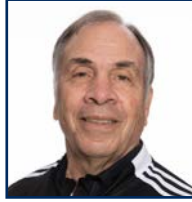
Prior to joining the club, Bilello was a Revolution season ticket holder, giving him an inside track on the team's fan experience. He enjoys working directly with supporters to ensure the club continues to prioritize their experience and every touch point they have with the club.

Bilello has over a decade of senior leadership and strategic management in professional sports. He joined Kraft Sports & Entertainment in 2003 and served the Revolution, the New England Patriots, Boston Uprising, and Gillette Stadium in various operational and strategic roles. He worked to improve the fan experience across all areas of Gillette Stadium. He has also overseen the stadium's concessions and retail operations, and provided strategic advice to the Kraft family on a number of issues related to their sports ventures, in particular, soccer, MLS, and the Revolution.

Bilello's experience in professional sports started prior to landing in Foxborough while working as a management consultant for Bain & Company. During his tenure with the company, he worked with clients across a variety of functions, including sports, retail, consumer products, and entertainment industries in Bain & Company's Boston and San Francisco offices.

An avid soccer player himself, Bilello played varsity soccer at MIT while studying engineering and economics and continues to play in his free time. He lives in Massachusetts with his wife, Vanessa, and two daughters. He is a member of the Board of Directors for Boston Scores, serves on Cradles 2 Crayons' Corporate Advisory Council, and was named to Boston Business Journal's "40 Under 40" in September 2012.





BRUCE ARENA SPORTING DIRECTOR & HEAD COACH

19TH MLS SEASON

ARENA AT A GLANCE

- Named the Revolution's sporting director and the club's eighth head coach on May 14, 2019.
- Holds a record five MLS Cup titles (1996, 1997, 2011, 2012, 2014), and shares the all-time record with three MLS Coach of the Year honors and four MLS Supporters' Shields.
- The all-time winningest MLS head coach and one of two coaches in league history to eclipse 200 regular season MLS wins and 700 career points, has won four Sigi Schmid MLS Coach of the Year awards (1997, 2009, 2011, 2021).
- Reached the MLS Cup final in seven of 18 seasons as an MLS head coach, with a record 35 MLS Cup Playoff wins and 54 postseason games coached.
- Managed the U.S. Men's National Team through two separate stints (1998-2006, 2016-17) and two FIFA Men's World Cups in 2002 and 2006, and won three Gold Cup titles as the program's winningest head coach.
- Built a dynasty over 18 seasons as head coach at the University of Virginia, winning five NCAA Division I National Championships and six ACC titles.

Bruce Arena is in his fifth season as Sporting Director and Head Coach of the New England Revolution after his appointment to the position on May 14, 2019. The five-time MLS Cup winner is the eighth head coach in club history and oversees all soccer operations for the New England Revolution, including head coaching duties, roster management, scouting, and the oversight of Revolution II and the Revolution Academy.

In his first four seasons at the helm in New England, Arena has led the side to three MLS Cup Playoff appearances. His .601 winning percentage with New England entering 2023 is the best of any manager in the club's history. In 2021, Arena won his record fourth Supporters' Shield, the first in Revolution history, after guiding the team to 22 wins, 73 points, and 2.15 points per game - all MLS records. For his efforts, Arena was awarded with his league-leading fourth MLS Coach of the Year honor.

In 2022, Arena became the all-time winningest head coach in MLS history. New England's victory on March 5, 2022 gave Arena his 241st career victory in MLS regular season play, surpassing Sigi Schmid for the most in league history. Arena reached 250 career wins on October 1, 2022, the first coach in the history of MLS to do so.



In 2020, his first full season in New England, Arena led the Revolution to the Eastern Conference Final. Arena's impact in New England was immediately evident upon his arrival in Foxborough. Arena made his return to the MLS postseason in 2019 by leading one of the most remarkable turnarounds in league history. After a 2-8-2 start had the Revolution sitting in last place in MLS, Arena went unbeaten in his first eight games at the helm and helped New England reach the postseason, ending a three-year drought for the club. The team's historic renaissance came despite Arena only making one in-season addition to the roster, bringing in Argentine striker Gustavo Bou via a club-record transfer in July.

The Long Island, N.Y. native joined the Revolution with one of the most decorated coaching careers in American soccer history that has spanned more than 40 seasons at the collegiate, professional, and international levels. Arena's MLS resume includes a record five MLS Cup titles, four Supporters' Shields, seven conference championships, one U.S. Open Cup title, and one Concacaf Champions' Cup. He has reached the MLS Cup final in seven of his 16 seasons coaching in the league. Arena has earned three MLS Coach of the Year selections, tied for the most all-time, first winning the honor in 1997 with D.C. United before being recognized in 2009 and 2011 with the LA Galaxy.

With 285 combined regular season and postseason wins in MLS entering the 2022 season, and a regular season record of 250-147-124 (.598), Arena is the league's all-time winningest head coach and owns the best winning percentage in MLS history. Arena is the league's all-time leader in MLS Cup Playoff games coached with 55 (35-13-7), while his 35 playoff wins are also the most in league history.

On the international stage, Arena, 71, coached the U.S. Men's National Team over two separate stints from 1998-2006 and 2016-17,

amassing the most wins in the program's history with a record of 81-35-32. He led the Stars and Stripes to a Quarterfinal finish in the 2002 FIFA Men's World Cup – the country's best showing since 1930 – as well as an appearance in the 2006 FIFA Men's World Cup. Arena also guided the U.S. Men's National Team to more Gold Cup titles than any other coach, capturing the continental trophy three times in 2002, 2005, and 2017.

Before his time in the professional ranks, Arena began his head coaching career with one season at the University of Puget Sound (1976), before being named the head coach at the University of Virginia in 1978. During his decorated 18-year tenure at Virginia, he led the Cavaliers to five NCAA Division-1 National Championships, including four in a row from 1991-94, as well as six ACC Men's Soccer titles (1988, 1991-95). While at Virginia, Arena coached a number of American soccer legends, including Claudio Reyna, John Harkes, and current D.C. United Head Coach Ben Olsen.

In 1996, Arena received an offer to lead the United States Under-23 Men's National Team in the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta. Shortly after the Olympics, he assumed the head role with D.C. United, where he led the Black-and-Red to a 61-35 record, including the first two MLS Cup titles in 1996 and 1997, and the Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup title in 1996.

Following the 1998 FIFA Men's World Cup in France, the United States Soccer Federation turned to Arena, who helped the team qualify for the 2002 FIFA Men's World Cup. In the tournament, Arena's team recorded an impressive win over powerhouse Portugal and topped Mexico, 2-0, in the Round of 16 en route to the nation's first appearance in the Quarterfinals in a 72-year span. That same year, Arena led the USMNT to the Concacaf Gold Cup title, one of his three triumphs in the competition.

In 2005, Arena won his second Concacaf Gold Cup ahead of the 2006 FIFA Men's World Cup in Germany. In the 2006 tournament, the United States earned a 1-1 draw against Italy, but a 2-1 defeat to Ghana sent the USMNT home early.

The next season, Arena took charge of the New York Red Bulls, where he spent the end of the 2006 season and all of the 2007 campaign. In 2008, Arena joined the LA Galaxy for what would be an incredible nine-year tenure that included three MLS Cups in a four-year span and two Supporters' Shields in 2010 and 2011.

Following his decorated career with the Galaxy, Arena rejoined the U.S. Men's National Team in November 2016. In his second run as head coach, he lost only two out of 18 games at the helm, though the United States fell short of qualification for the 2018 FIFA Men's World Cup. A 2010 National Soccer Hall of Fame inductee, Arena was named the 2015 Werner Fricker Builder Award recipient, earning U.S. Soccer's highest honor for his more than 40 years of service to the game.

A talented lacrosse player, Arena grew up on Long Island and would go on to attend Nassau Community College, where he played both lacrosse and soccer. Arena then transferred to Cornell University in 1971, where as a goalkeeper, he led his team to the 1972 NCAA College Cup Final Four and earned the tournament's Most Valuable Defensive Player award. During the 1973 season, Arena contributed as an assistant coach with Cornell, before then accepting a head coaching position at the University of Puget Sound.

Off the field, Arena has authored a number of books and is a member of the NJCAA Lacrosse Hall of Fame, after receiving induction in 2008. He and his wife, Phyllis, live in Boston. Arena's son, Kenny, was an assistant coach under his father with the LA Galaxy from 2014-16 and is now an assistant coach with FC Cincinnati.

CURT ONALFO TECHNICAL DIRECTOR

ONALFO AT A GLANCE

- Named Technical Director in June 2019, bringing extensive MLS coaching experience to the club, including stints as head coach of the Kansas City Wizards, D.C. United, and LA Galaxy.
- Spearheaded the launch of Revolution II, the club's development side, in 2020 as well as a complete overhaul of the club's Academy, including a 2022 Under-19 National Championship.
- An MLS Cup winner as both a player and a coach, capturing the title as a member of D.C. United in 1999, and later as an assistant coach for LA Galaxy in 2011, 2012, and 2014.
- Served as an assistant coach under Bruce Arena with the U.S. Men's National Team and LA Galaxy, and played for Arena at the University of Virginia.

Curt Onalfo is entering his fifth season as Technical Director of the New England Revolution after his appointment to the position on June 2, 2019. In his role, Onalfo works closely with Sporting Director Bruce Arena managing the club's day-to-day soccer operations, including oversight of Revolution II, the Revolution Academy, and the scouting department. In his four seasons with the club, Onalfo helped guide the Revolution back to the MLS Cup Playoffs on three occasions.

Since arriving in New England, Onalfo spearheaded the launch of Revolution II ahead of its inaugural season in USL League One in 2020, elevating the club's player development process by providing a fully defined pathway from the Academy to the professional ranks, facilitating growth through higher-level competition and a professional structure. In its three seasons, Revolution II paved the way for 42 players to make their professional soccer debuts, including 25 current and former Academy members.

Onalfo has overseen a renaissance in the club's Academy following the establishment of the new MLS NEXT Academy league. In two seasons, the Revolution Under-15 team reached the 2021 MLS NEXT Cup Quarterfinals and the Revolution Under-19 side won the 2022 MLS NEXT Cup National Championship. In addition, eight Revolution Academy players have signed directly to Revolution II and three additional players have been inked to Homegrown Player contracts with the first team.

The Sao Paulo, Brazil native and Ridgefield, Conn. Product brings his experience to the Revolution following an extensive coaching and playing career in Major League Soccer and with the United States Men's National Team. He owns 13 years of MLS coaching experience, highlighted by stints as head coach of D.C. United (2010), the Kansas City Wizards (2007-09), and the LA Galaxy (2017). While continuing as an assistant with the Galaxy, he also served as the inaugural head coach of USL Championship side LA Galaxy II from 2014-16, where he led the club to a Western Conference title in 2015. When he departed "Los Dos" to take over head coaching duties with the Galaxy first team, his overall record with the developmental side finished at 46-29-20.

On the international level, Onalfo spent six years as an assistant coach for the United States Men's National Team under Bruce Arena. He served as an assistant for the USMNT from 2002-07 - including at the 2002 and 2006 FIFA Men's World Cup™ - and also worked as an assistant with the U.S. Under-23 MNT in 2002. Prior to joining the Revolution, he most recently assisted the U.S. Under-20 Men's National Team from 2018 through May 2019, including in Poland at the FIFA U-20 Men's World Cup™, and briefly served as acting head coach of the U-19 side for a training camp in January 2019.

Onalfo, 51, entered the coaching ranks an assistant with D.C. United in 2000 following his retirement. He remained with the Black and Red until September 2002, briefly serving as interim head coach in 2001. After his time in the U.S. Men's National Team setup, Onalfo was appointed head coach of the Kansas City Wizards shortly after the 2006 FIFA Men's World Cup. He led Kansas City for two-and-a-half seasons, compiling a 27-29-22 record, and helped the club reach the postseason twice, including a Western Conference Finals appearance in 2007. In December 2009, Onalfo was named head coach of D.C. United, where he would remain for eight months before departing the club.

After starring as a defender at Ridgefield High School in Connecticut, Onalfo played collegiately for Bruce Arena at the University of Virginia from 1987-1990. In four seasons as a defender with the Cavaliers, he earned a pair of All-ACC First Team selections and helped the team win the 1988 ACC Championship. He began his professional career with French side La Ciotat in 1991, before featuring for the Connecticut Wolves of the USISL from 1994-95, and Mexican second division side Tampico Madero in 1995.

Onalfo was selected by the LA Galaxy in the inaugural MLS Draft and would make 13 appearances for the club in 1996, helping it reach the first ever MLS Cup. The defender went on to register 23 appearances across four seasons in MLS, spending additional time with San Jose (1997) and D.C. United (1998-99). He recorded one international cap with the U.S. Men's National Team and featured extensively at the youth level, including the 1989 FIFA World Youth Championship, the 1991 Pan American Games, and the 1992 Summer Olympics.

Onalfo's journey took a detour soon after the 1992 Olympics, when a diagnosis of stage three Hodgkin's disease at the age of 24 disrupted his career and nearly ended his life. After surviving his arduous battle with cancer, Onalfo resumed his playing career with Connecticut and then Mexican side Tampico FC, before joining the Galaxy for the inaugural MLS season.

Originally born in Sao Paulo, Brazil, Onalfo is a fluent Spanish and Portuguese speaker.

- Won three MLS Cups as a player with D.C. United in 1996, 1997, and 1999.

Richie Williams is entering his fifth season as Assistant Coach for the New England Revolution after joining Bruce Arena's staff in June 2019. He brings a wealth of playing and coaching experience throughout the American soccer landscape to the Revolution, including his previous role as head coach of D.C. United's USL Championship affiliate Loudoun United FC.

In his four seasons on New England's coaching staff, Williams has helped guide the Revolution to three postseason berths, a 2021 Supporters' Shield title, and an appearance in the 2020 Eastern Conference Final. During the 2020 season, Williams coached the Revolution through three unbeaten games in August 2020 in place of a suspended Bruce Arena, leading New England to a 1-0-2 mark.

Williams, 52, arrived in New England after spending the previous 15 years in a variety of coaching roles within Major League Soccer and the United States Men's National Team, including two stints as an assistant to Bruce Arena. He served as an assistant coach on Arena's staff with the USMNT from 2017-18, as well as the New York Red Bulls from 2006-07. While with the Red Bulls as an assistant coach from 2006-11, Williams completed two stints as New York's interim head coach in 2006 and 2009.

Most recently, Williams served as the first ever head coach of USL Championship side Loudoun United FC in 2019. He led Loudoun to a 2-3-4 record in its inaugural season before departing to join the Revolution's coaching staff. In addition, Williams spent one season as an assistant coach with Real Salt Lake in 2016. He was head coach of the United States Under-18 National Team from 2011-12 and managed the United States Under-17 National Team from 2012-15.

Williams, a native of Middletown Township, N.J., enjoyed a successful playing career prior to entering the coaching ranks. He played under Arena at multiple stops during his career, including at the University of Virginia from 1988-91, D.C. United from 1996-98, and the United States Men's National Team from 1998-2002. Williams also overlapped with Revolution Technical Director Curt Onalfo at Virginia for two seasons (1989-90). Williams won an NCAA Championship with the Cavaliers in 1991, before helping D.C. United to four consecutive MLS Cup appearances (1996-99), including championships in 1996, 1997, and 1999, and Supporters' Shields in 1997 and 1999.

The midfielder appeared in 169 games for D.C. United over six seasons, scoring eight goals. Beginning his career under Arena, Williams remained with D.C. United through the end of the 2000 MLS season before being traded to the New York/New Jersey MetroStars. During the 2001 campaign, Williams made 21 appearances for the MetroStars before eventually being traded back to D.C. United for the 2002 season. Williams would return to the MetroStars for his final season at the MLS level in 2003, again being traded from D.C. United along with Eddie Pope and Jaime Moreno for Mike Petke, a 2003 MLS SuperDraft pick, and allocation money.

Williams also earned 20 international caps with the U.S. Men's National Team under Arena, highlighted by a CONCACAF Gold Cup title in 2002. He also spent time with the Richmond Kickers in 1993, 1994-95, and 2004-05, Scottish side Ayr United FC from 1993-94, and the Buffalo Blizzard of the NPSL II Indoor League from 1992-93. Williams scored 10 goals over 30 games with the Blizzard during their inaugural season, helping the team reach the league quarterfinals. While with Richmond, in parts of five seasons, Williams was a member of the Kickers' 1995 U.S. Open Cup and USISL winning squad after returning from a brief stint in Europe.

VAN DEN BERGH AT A GLANCE

- Joined Revolution staff in July 2019 and brings more than a decade of coaching experience in MLS and across multiple roles in the U.S. Youth National Team system.
- Previously served as head coach of the Under-19 and Under-15 national teams, and as an assistant for the Under-20 side, including at the 2019 FIFA U-20 Men's World Cup in Poland.
- Enjoyed a decorated playing career across 16 seasons from 1995-2009, featuring extensively in the Dutch Eredivisie, La Liga, and Major League Soccer.
- Played under Revolution Sporting Director and Head Coach Bruce Arena with New York Red Bulls in 2007.
- Amsterdam native developed in AFC Ajax youth program and played under Louis van Gaal with hometown team.

Dave van den Bergh is entering his fifth season with the New England Revolution as an assistant coach, having joined the staff in July 2019 after nine years as a coach with various United States Youth National teams. In his first four seasons on New England's coaching staff, van den Bergh helped guide the Revolution to three postseason berths, the club's first-ever Supporter's Shield title and a league-record 73 points in 2021, and an appearance in the 2020 Eastern Conference Final.

Prior to joining the Revolution, the Amsterdam native most recently served as assistant coach for the United States Under-20 Men's National Team in 2019, his second stint in that role. In addition to working with the United States U-20 Men's National Team in 2019, van den Bergh coached the U-20 team as an assistant from 2010-16. Between those two tenures, he helped the U-20s to consecutive Quarterfinal appearances in the 2015 and 2019 FIFA U-20 Men's World Cups. Van den Bergh also served as head coach of the United States Under-19 team in 2018, and compiled an unbeaten 6-0-4 record as head coach of the Under-15 side from 2016-18.

Before embarking on his coaching career, van den Bergh, 44, enjoyed a decorated playing career from 1995-2009, featuring extensively in the Dutch Eredivisie, La Liga, and Major League Soccer. Growing up in Amsterdam, he developed in the AFC Ajax youth program for 10 years, surrounded by notable Ajax Academy products, including Dutch legend Clarence Seedorf and former FC Barcelona standout Patrick Kluivert. In 1995, van den Bergh signed with the Ajax first team, totaling 12 appearances across three seasons for his hometown club, including an Eredivisie league title in his debut season in 1995-96. Van den Bergh and Ajax also lifted the UEFA Super Cup in 1995, after defeating Spanish side Real Zaragoza, 5-1, on aggregate. The then-19-year-old also clinched a UEFA Champions League semifinals berth with the club under famed manager Louis van Gaal. During his stint with Ajax, he represented his country at the 1995 FIFA U-20 World Cup.

After a successful two-year stint in Holland, van den Bergh joined Segunda Division Spanish side Rayo Vallecano in Madrid. Over three seasons with the club, he logged 47 appearances and scored nine goals on the path to helping the club earn a promotion to La Liga's Primera Division ahead of the 1999-2000 campaign. Van den Bergh and Los Vallecanos played to a 4-0 aggregate victory over CF Extremadura in the Promotion Playoffs to clinch a berth to La Liga's Primera Division for the first time since 1997.

The attacker then transferred back to the Eredivisie with FC Utrecht, just one hour south of his hometown of Amsterdam. He would make 204 total appearances across all competitions, scoring 32 goals while tallying 32 assists in his time in Utrecht. In 2003, he was part of the Utrecht squad that defeated Feyenoord, 4-1, in the KNVB Dutch Cup—its second in club history. The team then won back-to-back domestic cup titles after defeating FC Twente, 1-0, in the 2004 edition of the KNVB Dutch Cup. Van den Bergh also helped secure the Johan Cruyff Shield for the Utrecht trophy case after defeating his former club Ajax, 4-2, at Amsterdam ArenA. Van den Bergh's play at Utrecht earned him two call-ups with the Dutch National Team, including his international debut in 2004 in a 2-2 draw against Sweden.

After nearly a decade in Europe and over 16,000 minutes played at Utrecht, van den Bergh made a move to Major League Soccer, signing with the Kansas City Wizards in 2006. In Kansas City, he made 13 appearances, scored three goals, and recorded two assists before being traded to the New York Red Bulls in 2007. He joined the Red Bulls under Head Coach Bruce Arena and made 29 appearances, with two goals and eight assists in his debut season in New York. In two years with the club, he amassed 55 total appearances, scoring nine goals and tallying 13 assists. Ahead of the 2009 season, the Red Bulls traded van den Bergh to FC Dallas. He played all 30 games with FC Dallas and scored three goals while recording an MLS career-high 11 assists.

In 2010, following his playing career, the Dutch international became an assistant coach with the United States U-20 National Team and stayed Stateside after obtaining a U.S. Green Card in 2007. Van den Bergh and his wife, Alexie, have three children, Ryan, Max, and Sam.

JOSEPH AT A GLANCE

- Made 305 appearances, with 296 starts, for New England across all competitions, including the second-most regular season appearances (261), starts (254), and minutes played (22,867) in Revolution history and is one of four Revolution players all-time to reach the 40g-40a mark.
- Finalist for 2009 MLS MVP in a season that saw him post career highs in goals (8) and assists (8).
- Selected as an MLS Best XI Player four times and to the MLS All-Star team on eight occasions, both Revolution records.
- Won the 2007 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup and the 2008 SuperLiga trophies as a player with the Revolution.
- Won four Eastern Conference Championships, including three consecutive from 2005-07.
- Twice named Grenada's Footballer of the Year and named the 2007 Caribbean Player of the Year.

Shalrie Joseph is entering his second season as an Assistant Coach with the New England Revolution on Bruce Arena's technical staff after joining the first team coaching staff in 2022 following two seasons as a coach with the Revolution Academy. A native of St. George's, Grenada, Joseph returned to the Revolution organization in 2020 as a Head Coach for the Revolution Academy Under-15 team. During his first season at the helm, Joseph guided the Revolution U-15s to the semifinals of the inaugural MLS NEXT Cup Playoffs in June 2021. Joseph continued coaching the 2006 age group in 2021-22, moving up to coach the Revolution U-17 side. During that time, he simultaneously served as an unofficial assistant with the first team during the team's record-setting 2021 Supporters' Shield campaign.

After a decorated playing career highlighted by more than 10 seasons with the New England Revolution, Joseph made his managerial debut as head coach of the Grenada National Team from 2018-19. He previously earned 20 international caps with the national team from 2002-08. As Grenada's head coach, he helped the side qualify for the 2021 Concacaf Gold Cup and earn promotion to League A in the 2019-20 Concacaf Nations League after an unbeaten 4-0-2 record in League B group play. After parting ways with the Grenada Football Association, Joseph began assisting with the Revolution Academy in an unofficial capacity. Prior to accepting the head coaching position with Grenada, Joseph also spent time as an assistant with the FC Boston Bolts Academy at the U-16 level.

Joseph, 44, entered the coaching ranks following an elite playing career that saw him record the second-most minutes and games played in Revolution club history. Selected 14th overall by the Revolution in the 2002 MLS SuperDraft, Joseph played for the club from 2003-2012, returning in 2014, and set longstanding records for games played and games started that remained intact for nearly a decade until Andrew Farrell surpassed those marks in 2021.

A general in central midfield, Joseph led New England to three straight MLS Eastern Conference titles from 2005-07. In addition to his eight consecutive MLS All-Star selections (2004-11) and four MLS Best XI nods (2005, 2007, 2008, 2009), both club highs, Joseph was recognized as a 2009 MLS MVP finalist. For all of his contributions, Joseph was named to the club's All-Time Team, recognizing the best head coach and 11 players in the first 25 years of the founding MLS team's history, as determined by a fan vote.

Originally drafted by the Revolution in the second round (14th overall) of the 2002 MLS SuperDraft, Joseph pursued playing opportunities with teams in Italy and Germany before returning to the United States, where he played for the New York Freedoms of the D3 Pro-League during the 2002 season. Scored seven goals and added one assist with the Freedoms.

In addition to his 10-plus years with New England, which also included 2007 Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup and 2008 North American SuperLiga titles, Joseph also played for MLS sides Chivas USA and Seattle Sounders FC in 2012 and 2013, respectively. He concluded his MLS career with 283 games played, 272 starts, 40 goals, 35 assists, and 24,538 minutes played in the regular season. He added 23 MLS Cup Playoff appearances, 21 of them coming with the Revolution.

A graduate of St. John's University in New York City, Joseph began his college career at Bryant & Stratton College in Syracuse, N.Y. for two years before transferring to St. John's prior to his junior year in 2000. With the Red Storm, Joseph earned NSCAA All-American honors at St. John's as a senior, leading the Red Storm to the 2001 NCAA College Cup semifinals where they lost to former Revs teammate Pat Noonan's Indiana squad. A two-time NSCAA All-region and two-time All-BIG EAST selection, his two-year goal total of 21 goals ranked 10th all-time at St. John's. Joseph scored 14 goals and added two assists as a junior in 2000 while playing forward, but retreated to defense as a senior, still managing to post seven goals and four assists in his final season.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Joseph Graduated from St. John's University with a degree in sports management. A citizen of Grenada, his family moved to Brooklyn when he was a teenager and Joseph considers himself a both New Yorker and a Grenadian.

KEVIN HITCHCOCK GOALKEEPERS COACH

HITCHCOCK AT A GLANCE

- Assistant coach in charge of goalkeeping joined Revolution in April 2019 and brings over two decades of coaching experiences in the top flights of England, Qatar, and India.
- Began coaching career in England with stints at Watford FC (2001-04), Blackburn Rovers FC (2004-08), Manchester City (2008-10), Fulham FC (2011), and Queens Park Rangers (2012-15).
- Spent majority of playing career at Chelsea FC, where he won two FA Cups and totaled 96 appearances from 1998-2001.
- Played more than 180 career games with Mansfield Town FC, helping them gain promotion to League One in 1986, and also made 17 appearances with Northampton Town (1990).

Kevin Hitchcock is entering his fifth season as Assistant Coach with the New England Revolution after joining the club on April 30, 2019. Hitchcock works primarily with the club's goalkeepers and brings 20 years of coaching experience to the staff, including stints in England, Qatar, and India, as well as a decorated 18-year playing career in England.

In his first four seasons coaching the Revolution's goalkeepers, Hitchcock has helped oversee the development of Matt Turner as the club earned three consecutive postseason berths. Turner, the 2021 Allstate MLS Goalkeeper of the Year, continued to take major strides under Hitchcock's tutelage. He backstopped the Revolution to a league-record 73 points and New England's first Supporters' Shield title last season. The Revolution goalkeeper also capped both the 2019 and 2020 seasons with top-five finishes in MLS Goalkeeper of the Year voting, including second-place honors in 2020 as he backstopped the Revolution to the Eastern Conference Final and a new franchise record for lowest goals-against average.

In 2022, with the arrival of goalkeeper Djordje Petrović, Hitchcock helped develop the 22-year-old Serbian international en route to record-setting numbers despite playing only 21 games and at least 1,000 fewer minutes than several of the league's top keepers. Since American Soccer Analysis began tracking advanced stats and analytics for MLS in 2013, Petrović's total of -10.66 goals prevented (G-xG) surpassed Tim Melia's (SKC) benchmark of -10.37 goals prevented from 2017. Petrović also topped Melia's 2017 league record of 10.92 goals added (G+) with 11.86 during the 2022 season. Petrović was a finalist for the 2022 Allstate MLS Goalkeeper of the Year and MLS Newcomer of the Year awards.

Before joining the Revolution, Hitchcock, who owns a UEFA "A" Goalkeeper License and UEFA "B" Coaching License, spent the previous 18 years as a first-team goalkeeper coach, including nine seasons working with top-flight players in the English Premier League. His experience began with a stint at Watford FC (2001-04), followed by stops at Blackburn Rovers FC (2004-08), Manchester City FC (2008-10), West Ham United FC (2010), Fulham FC (2010-11), and Queens Park Rangers FC (2012-15). In his time with these elite clubs, Hitchcock trained such goalkeepers as Brad Friedel, Joe Hart, Kasper Schmeichel, Shay Given, and Robert Green, among others.

The London native, 58, departed England for Al Arabi Sports Club in Qatar (2015-16), before returning to coach with Birmingham City FC (2016-18). Prior to joining the Revolution, he most recently spent one season as goalkeeper coach with Indian Super League side Chennaiyin FC (2018-19).

During his tenure with Blackburn, Hitchcock directed the goalkeepers during one of the most successful periods in club history. In his four years with Rovers, the club reached the FA Cup Semifinals twice, recorded a top-seven finish in the Premier League, and qualified for the UEFA Europa League. He also helped Queens Park Rangers secure promotion to the Premier League following the 2013-14 season, when the club defeated Derby County in the 2013/14 Play-Off Final.

Before launching his coaching career with Watford, Hitchcock totaled nearly 300 appearances as a player in England. His playing career was highlighted by two FA Cup titles, one Cup Winners Cup, and one Super Cup with Chelsea FC. In total, he recorded 96 appearances for The Blues from 1988-2001, also completing loan assignments to West Ham United FC (1993) and Northampton Town FC (1990). Prior to joining Chelsea, he began his senior career with Mansfield Town FC, where he made more than 180 appearances from 1984-88. At the youth level, he played briefly for Chelsea, as well as with Nottingham Forest FC and Barking FC.

Chris Tierney is entering his second season as Director of Soccer Operations with the New England Revolution. Promoted to the position on Feb. 11, 2022, Tierney previously served as a Player Recruitment manager from 2019-22, primarily serving in a scouting role working under the direction of Technical Director Curt Onalfo and Sporting Director/Head Coach Bruce Arena.

Tierney transitioned into the front office in August 2019 following a decorated 11-year playing career from 2008-18, all with the Revolution, and was long regarded as one of Major League Soccer's top left backs. He announced his retirement in November 2018, finishing his tenure as one of the club's all-time leaders in several statistical categories. Tierney still ranks among the club's top five for games played (246), games started (220), and assists (40).

As a player, the Wellesley, Mass. native helped New England to a 2008 North American SuperLiga title as well as appearances in the 2014 MLS Cup and 2016 U.S. Open Cup finals. Among his career accolades are an MLS All-Star Team selection in 2015, Revolution Defender of the Year honors in 2016, and Midnight Riders Man of the Year recognition in 2016.

Tierney played collegiately from 2004-08 at the University of Virginia, where he was coached by current Revolution Assistant Coach Richie Williams when Williams was an assistant with the Cavaliers (2005-06). Tierney joins several other notable figures in UVA's soccer history in New England's front office, as Sporting Director & Head Coach Bruce Arena served as head coach from 1978-95, winning five NCAA Division-I National Championships with six conference titles. Technical Director Curt Onalfo (1987-90) and Williams (1988-91) also played their collegiate soccer at UVA during Arena's tenure.

Tierney currently resides in Charlestown, Mass. with his wife, Eliza, and his daughter, Shiloh.

Remi Roy is entering his 14th season with the New England Revolution and his sixth as the club's Director of Scouting & Player Personnel, having been named to the position in January 2018. Roy has been with the club since 2010, previously serving as an assistant coach with New England for eight seasons.

In his current role, Roy is focused on scouting and talent identification in players at the collegiate, national, and international levels. He works closely with the Revolution technical staff in player evaluation and has a role in all soccer-related aspects of the organization, including communication with agents and facilitating MLS communication and compliance.

Roy was heavily engaged in the Revolution's scouting operations throughout his tenure as an assistant coach, contributing to the club's domestic and international scouting efforts. As an assistant coach, first under Steve Nicol and then on Jay Heaps' staff, he worked primarily with the Revs' first-team goalkeepers and provided additional training for Revolution Academy goalkeepers.

During his time on the Revs' coaching staff, Roy mentored several talented goalkeepers and helped them each achieve success in the professional ranks. In addition to coaching former Revs goalkeeper Matt Reis in his pursuit of MLS longevity and success, Roy helped Bobby Shuttleworth establish himself as one of the league's premier goalkeepers since his debut in 2010. In 2016, Roy's guidance helped Brad Knighton start a career-high 13 matches, including six wins.

Roy joined the Revolution after 10 years as the assistant coach/goalkeepers coach for both the men's and women's soccer teams at the University of Mobile in Alabama, his alma mater. During his tenure in Mobile, Roy was a member of the Region III goalkeeper staff. He also served as the Puerto Rico national team's goalkeepers coach in its preparations for the 2010 FIFA World Cup.

In addition to his various coaching positions, Roy spent five years as a player-coach in the United Soccer League (USL) with the Syracuse Salty Dogs (2003) and the Virginia Beach Mariners (2004-07). Roy played collegiately at the University of Mobile from 1997-99. In his final season in 1999, Roy garnered all-conference, all-region, and All-American honors. He also played five seasons in the Premier Development League (PDL) with the Jackson Chargers (1998-99), Des Moines Menace (2000), and the Spokane Shadow (2001). Roy holds a USSF "A" License and Level I and II NSCAA Goalkeeping Licenses.

A native of Petit-Rocher, New Brunswick, Canada, Roy lives south of Boston with his wife and three kids.

In his role with the Loons, he helped oversee all nutritional aspects of the squad, administered strength and fitness programs, and participated in daily training sessions. Prior to his time with Minnesota, Collins was the Head Fitness Coach for the Sporting Kansas City Academy and Sporting KC II, a position he held for two seasons beginning in 2017.

Before ascending to the professional ranks, Collins held several positions at the collegiate level both in the NCAA and overseas. A native of Ireland, Collins held Strength and Conditioning Internships at Springfield College, Boston University, and Northeastern. Following his internships, Collins became the Assistant Strength & Conditioning Coach at Northeastern University from November 2016 through February 2017. Before coming to the United States, Collins held the title of Strength & Conditioning Coach at Trinity College Dublin (2013-14) and Belvedere College S.J. (2012-14).

Collins earned his undergraduate degree at the Technological University of Dublin in 2014 before attending graduate school at Springfield College in Massachusetts, where he received his master's degree in Strength & Conditioning.
