

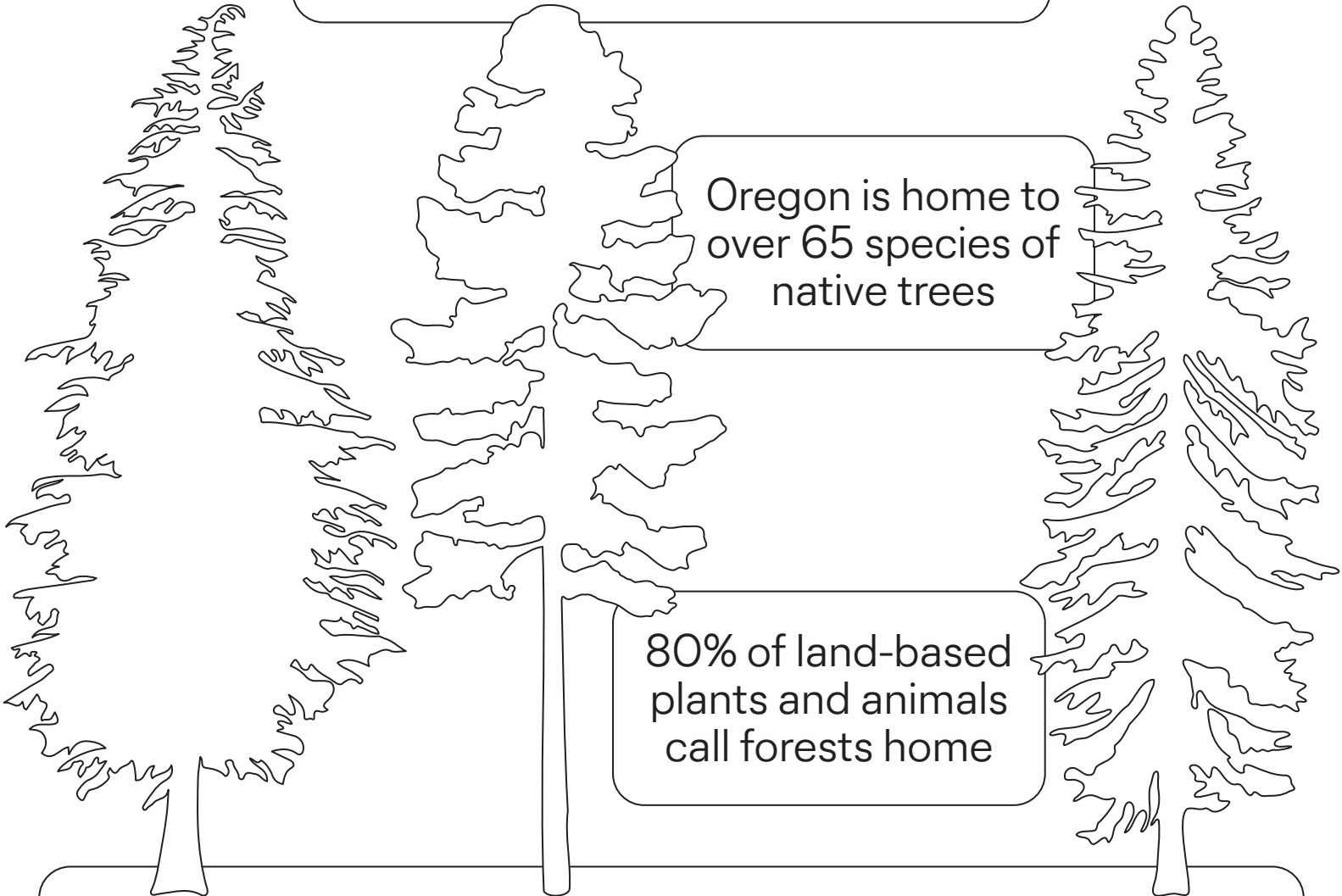
# NATURE UNITES US

48% of Oregon (30.4 million acres) is covered by forests—that's as much land as the state of Pennsylvania

Oregon is home to over 65 species of native trees

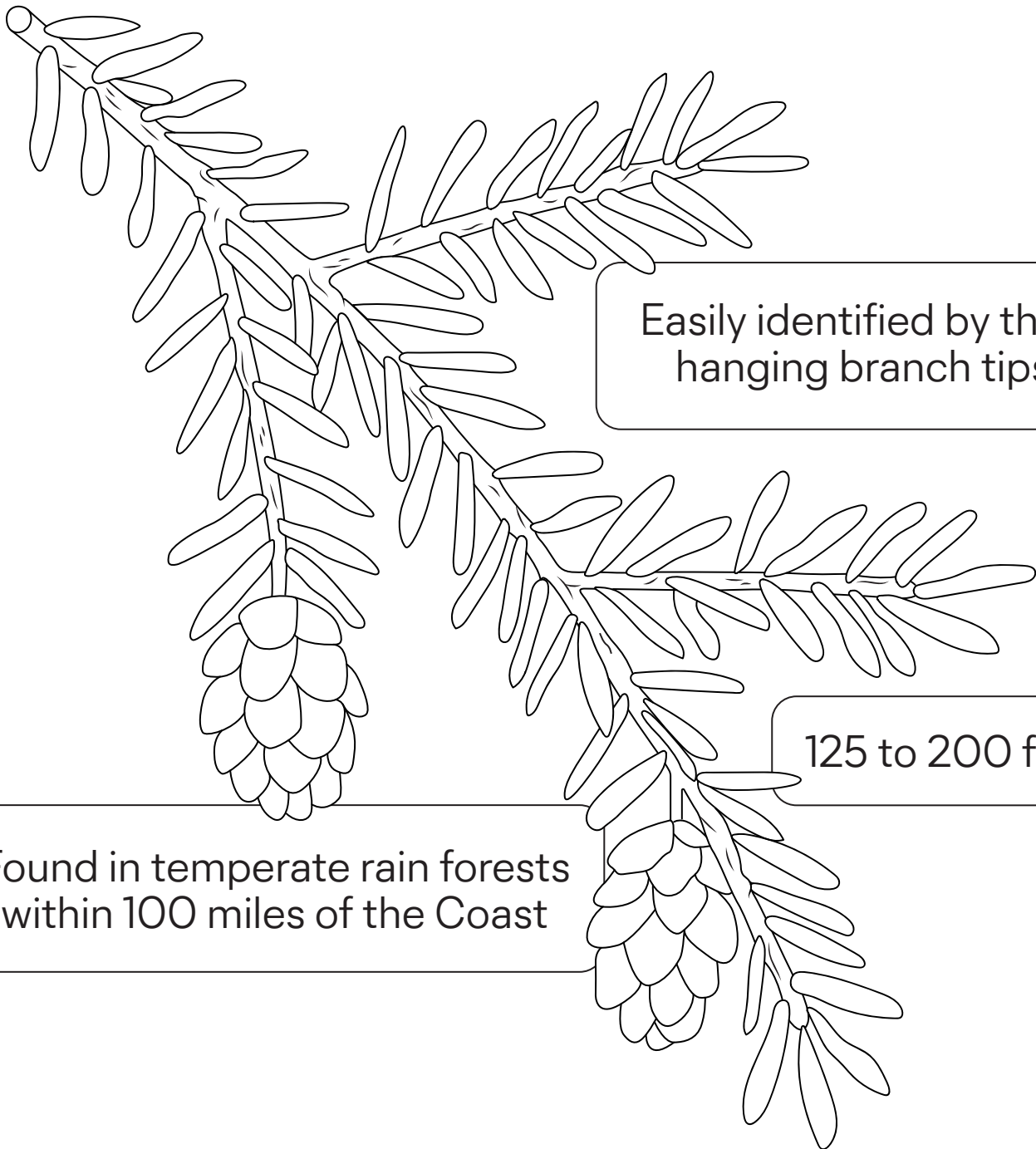
80% of land-based plants and animals call forests home

Many tree species have root systems that stretch underground as wide as they are tall, so a tree that is 165 feet tall may have a root system as large as a soccer pitch



# WESTERN HEMLOCK

*(Tsuga heterophylla)*



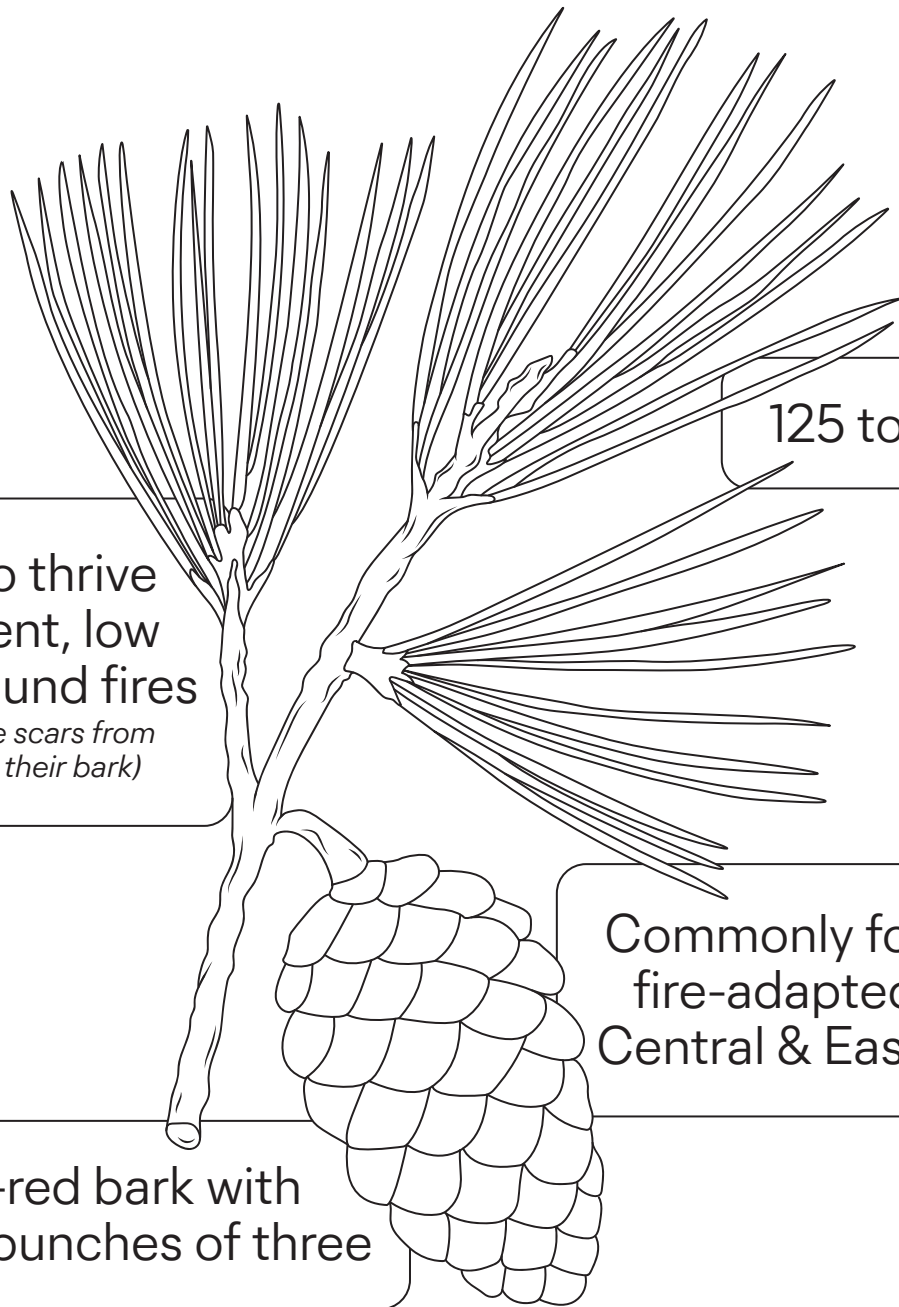
Easily identified by their  
hanging branch tips

125 to 200 feet tall

Found in temperate rain forests  
within 100 miles of the Coast

# PONDEROSA PINE

*(Pinus ponderosa)*



125 to 180 feet tall

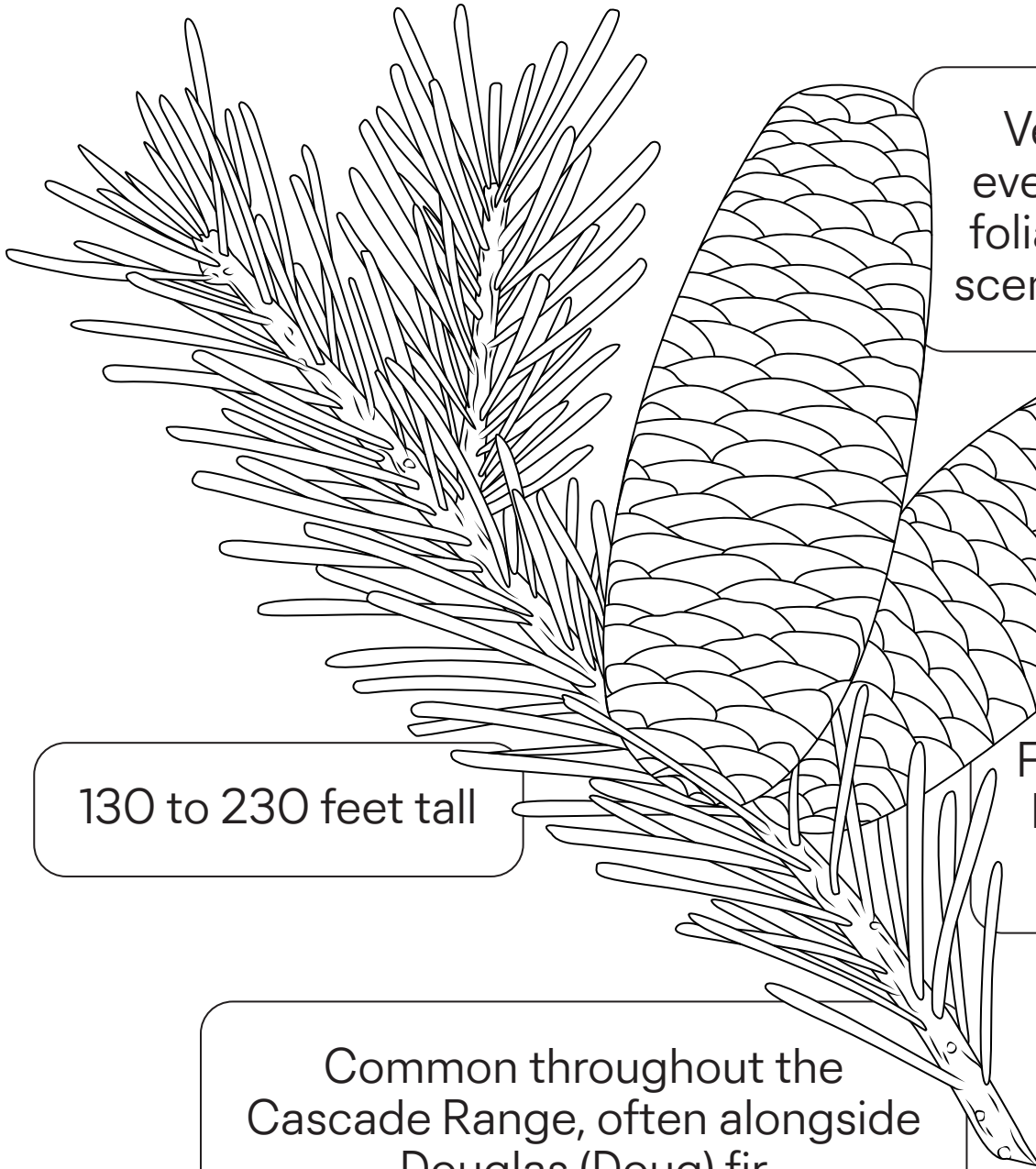
Adapted to thrive  
with frequent, low  
intensity ground fires  
*(you can often see scars from  
previous fires on their bark)*

Commonly found in drier,  
fire-adapted forests of  
Central & Eastern Oregon

Orange-red bark with  
needles in bunches of three

# GRAND FIR

*(Abies grandis)*



Very prominent evergreen scent—foliage has a citrus scent when crushed

130 to 230 feet tall

Fastest growing North America fir species

Common throughout the Cascade Range, often alongside Douglas (Doug) fir
