COMMITMENT TO COMMUNITY

FC Cincinnati (FCC) and FC Cincinnati Foundation (FCCF) is committed to leaving a legacy, creating something bigger than ourselves, and being the embodiment of a rising Cincinnati. Through our own programs, initiatives, and the support of key partners, we will improve the lives of children through soccer and will continue to do our part to create an inclusive community in the Greater Cincinnati region.

In addition to the programming we facilitate, we have invested heavily in partner organizations, including \$100,000 in grant funding to support community building initiatives in the West End each year. Since our launch, over \$600,000 has been invested to support community building initiatives in the neighborhood.

LEARNING IS COOL

Learning Is Cool is an education incentive program that rewards and recognizes students for strong academic performance.

Learning Is Cool recognizes and rewards students from Cincinnati Public Schools, Covington Independent Public Schools, North College Hill District, and Cincinnati College Preparatory Academy. Students who reach the “A” Honor Roll (3.51+ GPA) at the end of each grading period receive a reward and a congratulatory letter from FC Cincinnati leadership. Students who achieve the honor roll two or more times during the school year are invited to attend the Academic Achievement Celebration presented by CTI at the Cincinnati Zoo & Botanical Garden with their families. Here, they can receive their medal of achievement from FC Cincinnati players, have their photo taken and interact with them, meet Gary the Lion, and enjoy everything the Zoo has to offer.

- Over 24,800 rewards distributed during the 2023-2024 school year.
- 8,398 students were honored for their achievements at this year's Academic Achievement Celebration at the Cincinnati Zoo, an increase of 8% from 2023, indicating more students achieving the Honor Roll this school year.



MINI PITCHES

FC Cincinnati Foundation is committed to building safe places for children to play soccer.

The club has funded 10 small-sided soccer fields, or mini pitches, allowing children and people across the Greater Cincinnati region to play soccer safely and for free. The club has committed to building another 10 mini pitches in the coming years. The next mini pitch is set to open in Hamilton, Ohio in early 2025.

Mini pitches host regularly scheduled programming for recreation centers and non-profits and are available for free play to members of the community.

SOCCER UNITES

Soccer Unites, presented by Old Spice, brings soccer to in-school and after-school programs to increase access to the game. It is led by Club Ambassadors and former players Omar Cummings and Manu Ledesma.

The program provides opportunities for students to learn the fundamentals of soccer through the Club Ambassadors taking over their gym classes, implementing soccer skills, and working on character building attributes through team sport. Beyond our time in gym class, playbooks and equipment are left with the schools to continue facilitating soccer activities.

In partnerships with the Cincinnati Recreation Commission, Activities Beyond the Classroom, Boys and Girls Club, YMCA, and Lord's Gym, our after-school program offers a designed curriculum, staff training, and equipment to facilitate soccer as part of the after-school activities. All children in the after-school program receive shin guards, a program shirt and personal soccer ball and are invited to an end of season celebration at TQL Stadium.

- In 2024, the club provided 836 hours of programming, reached over 10,750 participants, and made 169 staff appearances.
- The club celebrated at the Soccer Unites End of Year Celebration in conjunction with TQL, honoring each student for their participation in the program.

FCC FUTURES

FCC Futures, presented by Old Spice, is a multi-tiered mentorship and professional development program designed to highlight and help students explore the varied professional opportunities for a career in sport.

Cincinnati Public School and Cincinnati College Preparatory Academy juniors and seniors gain employment as Guest Experience Ambassadors at TQL Stadium and are automatically enrolled in the FCC Futures program. Over the course of the year, these students are invited to join Education Sessions at TQL Stadium learning from leaders at FCC, Mercy Health, and Procter and Gamble about different careers in sport.

- 21 students participated during the Spring and Fall learning sessions.



STAY IN THE GAME

In the fight against chronic absenteeism, FC Cincinnati Foundation brought Stay in the Game! (STIG!) to seven districts, impacting 51,954 students for the 2024/2025 school year. Established in 2019 by the Cleveland Browns Foundation, Ohio Department of Education and Workforce and Harvard's Proving Ground, and managed by Battelle, the STIG! Attendance Network works together to campaign, connect, and convene with experts and supporters to increase attendance in Ohio. FCCF, along with the Cleveland Browns and Columbus Crew, support the Network's 161 districts and nearly 500,000 students through localized, data-informed attendance campaigns aimed at raising awareness of the importance of school attendance as a foundation for student success and identifying barriers to attendance. We look forward to growing the number of districts in our region joining the STIG! Network helping to decrease chronic absenteeism and supporting a brighter future for our students.

- In 2024, seven school districts, consisting of 51,954 children, participated in the program across the Southwest district of Ohio.



WEST END PRIDE

West End Pride, presented by Mercy Health, brings recreation level soccer to children in the West End neighborhood at no cost.

West End Pride teams participate in weekly practice sessions, matches, and special events as a part of SAY (Soccer Association for Youth) East. The program is free to participants, with gear and equipment funded by the FC Cincinnati Foundation and supported by volunteer coaches.

- This year, 559 members participated across Spring and Fall seasons, which increased by 22% from 2023.
- Families participate in Parents Night and end of season celebrations to build community.



UNITING OUR COMMUNITY AND CELEBRATING TOGETHER

FCC is committed to leaving a legacy, creating something bigger than ourselves, and being the embodiment of a rising Cincinnati. FCC is focused on creating a welcoming environment for all members of the Cincinnati community. The club celebrated specialty months with a focus on amplifying community partners and bringing people in the community together to celebrate big moments through the sport of soccer.



BLACK HISTORY MONTH

For the third year in a row, FCC and FCCF, in conjunction with the D.A.D. Initiative (Directing Adolescent Development), hosted Black Futures at TQL Stadium. Local juniors and seniors participated in this program designed to inspire their success; Over 300 teen students attended and over 100 Black professionals spoke about their careers and pathways to success. All guests enjoyed lunch courtesy of LaRosa's Pizzeria.



BREAKING BARRIERS

FC Cincinnati along with Procter & Gamble's Always and Secret brands hosted an event featuring women leaders from FCC, Procter & Gamble, and other leading sports organizations in Cincinnati. 125 women attended the event listening to the advice of speakers and participating in group activities to drive career development and advancement within the industry.



ASIAN AMERICAN AND PACIFIC ISLANDER MONTH

FC Cincinnati supported Asian American and Pacific Islander Month at events including Asian Food Fest, with the Street Team, presented by Cleveland Cliffs. The club also celebrated during the May 29th match by hosting a band with AAPI singers, as well as featuring local AAPI business and food trucks at Washington Park.



JUNETEENTH

FC Cincinnati celebrated Juneteenth by participating in the Juneteenth Festival, Juneteenth Block Party, and walking in the Juneteenth Parade with Gary the Lion.

On June 19, the club celebrated with a Juneteenth match, highlighting community leaders through the game ball delivery and the sword ritual. Organizations were present in Washington Park during pre-match festivities providing fans the chance to learn more about the holiday.



PRIDE

FC Cincinnati supported the LGBTQIA+ community during the club's annual Pride match, presented by Procter & Gamble. At Washington Park, Procter & Gamble hosted the "BeYOUtification Station," where park-goers were encouraged to pick up samples of Procter & Gamble products. The club highlighted Cincinnati artist, DJ Boywife, during the festivities. The Street Team also attend various events, such as the Cincinnati Pride Parade, Cincinnati Pride Festival, Batesville Pride Festival, and the Lawrenceburg Pride Festival.



HISPANIC HERITAGE

FC Cincinnati celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month at TQL Stadium during the annual "Noche Latina" match. At Washington Park, Luciano Acosta's barber gave free haircuts to guests, while salsa dancers and La Mega entertained families with salsa dancing lessons. In the stadium, Argentinian Manu Ledesma, former player and Club Ambassador, kicked off the match by pulling the ritual sword. FC Cincinnati runs soccer outreach within the Latino community year-round.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

FCC believes in inspiring the next generation, and all individuals, to dream big about their future. This is evidenced through FCCF-led programming along with the support of organizations with career-based programs. From hosting the D.A.D. initiative, to FCC Futures, to the FCCF's long-standing support of CityLink's Culinary program, we are proud to use the passion of sport as a driver for individuals to prepare for their career.



FUNDRAISING EVENTS

SERVED BY THE PROS

FCCF hosted the fifth annual Served by the Pros, sponsored by First Financial Bank. This year, VIP guests had the opportunity to take a photo with players on the field with the Supporters' Shield and the pre-match ritual stone. The night continued with Challenge the Pro stations, live music, a silent auction, and raffle to wrap up the night's festivities. 650 people attended with over \$300,000 raised to support FCCF and its' key programs.



LADIES LACE UP

Ladies Lace Up, presented by Secret, was a success in its fifth year. This event brought over 125 women to visit Mercy Health Training Center for a night of soccer and fun with a chalk talk from Head Coach Pat Noonan, soccer activities with coaches, and a special appearance from player Luciano Acosta. The event raised over \$75,000 for FCCF's programs.



COMMUNITY BENEFITS AGREEMENT

FC Cincinnati is committed to giving back to our community and supporting those in the West End. The club continues to fulfill and exceed the commitments outlined in the club's Community Benefits Agreement with The Port and West End Community Council.

The agreement identifies community priorities that aim to improve the quality of life in the West End. The below highlights are from 2024:

- Continued to build and invest in our youth soccer programs through West End Pride and Soccer Unites.
- Distributed sixth installment of \$100,000 in grant funding to support non-profit business in the West End, totaling \$600,000 since FCCF's inception.
- The Street Team and Gary the Lion attended various West End events including Ezz Fest, West End Fall Fest, and West End Winter Wonderland Event.
- The Club worked with Adopt a Class to sponsor four classrooms, two of which are in the West End. Staff volunteered with students monthly.
- The club hosted Getting Spooky with Gary the Lion, an event for West End families to come to TQL Stadium and collect candy ahead of Halloween.
- The club hosted a food drive in partnership with Kroger, raising \$13,290 to support La Soupe and Last Mile Food Rescue.
- The club participated in the annual Giving Tree to support families through Saint Vincent de Paul's Christmas Together program.
- Club staff volunteered a total of 3,433 hours for events in the West End and the Greater Cincinnati area.



GRANT RECIPIENTS

FC Cincinnati has pledged to invest a minimum of \$100,000 into the West End community for a minimum of 30 years as a part of the club Community Benefits Agreement. To date, the club has provided over \$600,000 in grant funding to various organizations.

The commitment is fulfilled through the FC Cincinnati Foundation with grants provided to non-profits either in the West End or those supporting community development within the neighborhood.

2024 grant recipients included:

- **Adopt a Class Foundation:** to support transportation for field trips and student cultural/post high school pathway experiences for West End students.
- **Bright Star Community Church:** to support the cost of operating expenses for summer camp.
- **Cincinnati College Preparatory Academy:** to provide uniforms and team meals for the boys and girls basketball programs.
- **CityLink Center:** to support the CityLink Culinary Training Program.
- **Hays-Porter Families Forward:** to provide bikes and a celebratory meal for 30 third graders passing their state assessment.
- **Healthy Visions:** to support social and emotional programs at Taft High School.
- **Our Daily Bread:** to support the purchase of new equipment and food storage options.
- **Q-Kidz Dance Team:** to support general operating and program expenses.
- **Robert O-Neal Multicultural Arts Center (ROMAC):** to support youth art programming for West End residents.
- **Seven Hills Neighborhood Houses:** to support expenses to host the 2024 Ezz Fest event.
- **Sleep in Heavenly Peace:** to support the materials cost and construction of sixty beds which will be provided to youth in the West End.
- **Taft High School:** to support expenses for the back-to-school celebration and prom.
- **West End Lil Senators Football and Cheer:** to aid in the refurbishment of helmets and uniforms and to support venue and league fees to help reduce the cost for participants and their families.
- **West End Reds Baseball Organization:** to purchase new uniforms and to help reduce the cost for participants and their families.



YOUTH CAMPS AND CLINICS

FC Cincinnati Youth Camps allow children ages 4-14 the opportunity to learn from former FC Cincinnati players and club staff. Camps offer an in-depth focus on teaching the fundamentals of soccer through fun activities and direct engagement from staff.

In 2024, 1,767 kids participated in camps across the span of the calendar year. Day Camps were hosted at 17 locations and four elite camps were hosted during the year, marking a record number of appearances for the club in only the second year of camps programming. This year, the club hosted its first ever camp at TQL Stadium, where guests were able to train on the pitch, take a tour of TQL Stadium, and meet with players.

Outside of camps, eight clinics were hosted throughout the region with 417 athletes attending across all appearances.

New in 2024, FCC hosted its first Youth Camp targeted toward Latino and Latina players. The Youth Camp was run by former players Corben Bone and Manu Ledesma to provide a special training opportunity for kids in the Hispanic community. This lined up with the club's Noche Latina match and allowed over 40 kids to learn from the former professionals and club staff.



OTHER FC CINCINNATI COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

APPEARANCES

Gary the Lion, the Street Team, FCC first team players and FCC2 players made over 450 appearances during the year, covering the Greater Cincinnati region as well as Middletown and Dayton. Community Events allow FCC to connect with fans and support community priorities and events.



GREENER GOALS

As a part of MLS Works Greener Goals initiative, FCC staff participated in two service projects. At the Lunken Playground cleanup, FCC staff, players, and Gary the Lion laid out new mulch and repainted playground equipment and tables to improve safety for visitors. FCC staff also partnered with Scrap2Home, an organization that transforms reclaimed wood, otherwise destined for landfills, into furniture. FCC staff built tables that were donated to families in need.



OTHER FC CINCINNATI COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

“HELL IS REAL” BLOOD DRIVE COMPETITION

FC Cincinnati and the Columbus Crew hosted the second annual “Hell is Real” Blood Drive Competition, collecting donations from 24,075 people in Cincinnati and Columbus during the month-long competition to help save lives.



SALUTE TO SERVICE

FC Cincinnati partnered with People Working Cooperatively and Sherwin Williams to support a local veteran through home improvements.

At TQL Stadium, the club celebrated during the Salute to Service match by recognizing active-duty service members and veterans with a joint color guard, showcasing different military groups at Washington Park, and providing an opportunity for families to write letters to service members currently overseas. We are proud to recognize those who serve.



KICK CHILDHOOD CANCER

During the month of September, we brought awareness to Kick Childhood Cancer. The month started off with a special visit at Mercy Health Training Center. We had the distinguished honor of meeting Paddy, a young man fighting this devastating disease. Paddy is a soccer fanatic and had a dream to shoot PK's against a professional goalkeeper as part of his 18th birthday celebration. Paddy and his family joined us for a day of training where we had the pleasure of granting his birthday wish.



FC Cincinnati also partnered with Cancer Free Kids, The Dragonfly Foundation, Cincinnati's Ronald McDonald House, and The Cure Starts Now for activities around our August 31 home match. Each organization sent children battling or who have kicked cancer to serve as walk-out kids and enjoy the match with their family.

These children, along with others, also had the opportunity to participate in a Super Car Therapy ride with the Driven Project. The night was also highlighted with a special delivery of the game ball by Ryder. Our friend Max, who is thriving beyond his cancer diagnosis, performed the sword ritual with an assist from Matt Miazga.

FOOD DRIVE

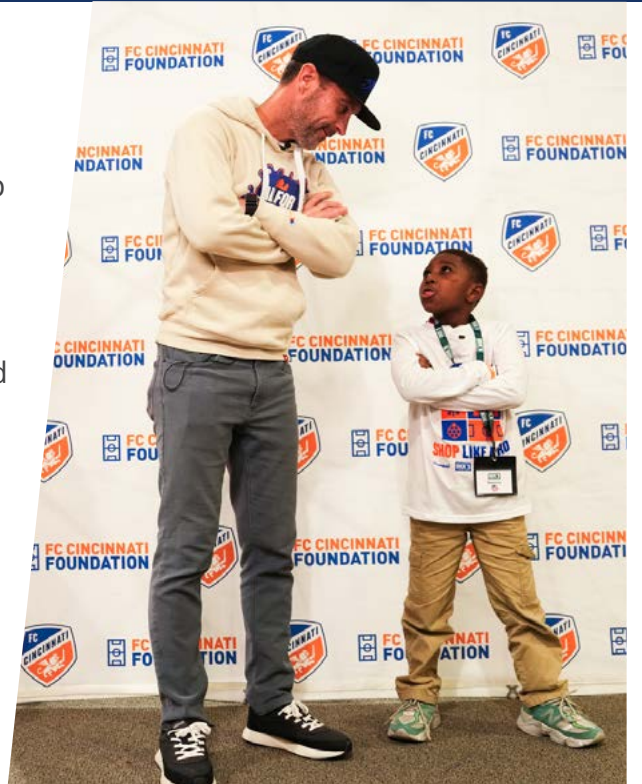
FCC and Kroger joined forces during the holiday season to help kick hunger and help those in need by hosting a food drive in support of La Soupe and Last Mile Food Rescue. FCC staff donated over 1,600 non-perishable food items and monies, with Kroger matching our efforts and providing grants to each organization in the amount of \$5,000 each. Together, we raised \$13,290.00 to aid in serving those in need across the Greater Cincinnati area.

SHOP LIKE A PRO

The holidays came early for students in the Greater Cincinnati area at FCC's Shop Like a Pro event. Students who could use some extra support around the holidays were selected by their schools to participate. The students were surprised with a limo ride, provided by A Savannah Nite, to Dick's Sporting Goods where they received a gift card to shop with Head Coach Pat Noonan and FCC Legends. Following their shopping, the students enjoyed dinner from Outback Steakhouse and dessert from Nothing Bundt Cakes.

FCC GIVING TREE

The club worked with Saint Vincent de Paul to provide gifts for families as a part of their Christmas Together program. Throughout the month of December, FCC staff sponsored five families and brought in over 100 items that were given to families in the West End.



OTHER FC CINCINNATI COMMUNITY INITIATIVES

TELETHON AND CLEAT DRIVE

FCCF partnered with WCPO 9, Scripps Howard Fund, and First Financial Bank to provide cleats and soccer equipment to local kids. During the month of May, fans were encouraged to donate new or gently used cleats to any First Financial Bank location. In addition to the cleat drive, and with help from current players, WCPO 9 hosted a telethon during their evening newscast, raising over \$6,000 to support our efforts to outfit kids in need with the proper and safe soccer equipment.

FCC 50/50 RAFFLE

The FC Cincinnati Foundation 50/50 raffle was hosted during each home match with half of the proceeds going to one lucky fan and half of the proceeds benefiting FCCF programs. Fans also had the ability this year during certain matches to buy early for specialty items such as a Luca Orellano signed Rally Towel and a Team Signed Soccer Ball. Throughout 2024, the club raised over \$57,000 through the 50/50 raffle.
